The regular March meeting of the chapter was held on March 15th, 1960 at the Cathay House with Chapter President A.H. Hargreaves in the chair. The meeting was called to order at 7.15 p.m.

Minutes of the February meeting were read by Treasurer P. Fortier and adopted as read on a motion by G. Wild seconded by R. Legare.

President Hargreaves called on the Treasurer to give a brief interim financial report. The report indicated that on the year's operation to date there was a credit balance of \$1.30, and the Chapter's total assets were \$527.78.

President Hargreaves then introduced the special guests from Carleton University which were Dr. John Ruptash, Dean of Engineering and two third-year engineering students, J. Fennessy and J.N. Beshara who were the 1st and 2nd prize winners respectively of the Chapter's donation to the Engineering Faculty of Carleton University.

President Hargreaves presented ~~6~~ cheque to each of the winners and offered the Chapter's congratulations and best wishes.

The guest speaker Prof. W. Bruce, chairman of the Department Mechanical Engineering was introduced by N. Kirby. The topic of Prof. Bruce's address was Trends in Engineering Education. In his talk Prof. Bruce stressed the fact that Engineering education is undergoing a number of changes today in order to keep pace with the large number of recent basic research developments. The major change has been a much greater stress in fundamentals particularly in mathematics and physics and much less stress in teaching empirical methods and techniques which become outmoded before they are even organized into the curricula.

Professor Bruce was thanked on behalf of the Chapter by J. Partington.

In his closing remarks President Hargreaves mentioned that 16 new applications for membership in the Society had been forwarded to New York from our Ottawa Valley Chapter Area.

The meeting was adjourned at 9.30 p.m. and the usual social hour followed.
