The Regional Conference Chairman Bill Robinson reported good progress by his committees. He outlined the complete itinerary of business and social events planned for the Conference. Following the usual break period Peter Karn introduced the guest speaker for the evening, Mr. Bill Phillips, who is a research biologist with the Department of Agriculture in Ottawa.

Mr. Phillips presented a most interesting talk on biological and engineering principles involved in controlling the atmosphere for storage of fruit and vegetables. Temperature, carbon dioxide and oxygen control have been found essential in the prevention of storage disorders in the complex structure of fruit and vegetable products. For example the most beneficial effect is achieved in the storage of apples when the atmosphere is controlled to 5% carbon dioxide, 3% oxygen and the temperature maintained at 38°F.

More recent benefits have been achieved by the use of cobalt 60 irradiation.

Mr. Phillips included some coloured slides in his discussion to illustrate most of the important points of his talk.

Following a discussion period the speaker was thanked by Ed Jackson.

Hearnden "that the meeting adjourn" - motion carried.
