## PROGRAM

When a second, independent opinion on design or energy management is required, Bob Tamblyn is on call to companies around the world. To date, his experience and engineering knowledge have made themselves felt on an estimated \$3 billion of varied projects in North America and Europe.

Bob Tamblyn designed some of the earliest thermal storage systems in Canada. In 1968, when heating and cooling ducts were non-standardized and all branch fittings had to be hand made, he reduced the design chaos to 4 duct size systems that needed no branch fittings and reduced labour costs by fifty percent. Compartmentalization was also a Tamblyn concept, revolutionizing the practice of putting central fans and air shafts on special floors.

Bob Tamblyn is an active member and director of well over a dozen energy, research, engineering and technical associations, including the Association of Professional Engineers of the Province of Ontario, Alberta and Newfoundland; Building Owners and Managers Association, Toronto Chapter; Ontario Research Foundation Advisory Committee; American Society of Heating, Refrigerating & Air Conditioning Engineers; consulting editor of Canadian Consulting Engineer, Member of Council - Association of Professional Engineers of the Province of Ontario and DESIGNATED ENERGY MANAGEMENT SPECIALIST.
