PROGRAM: THE MOUNTAIN EQUIPMENT CO-OP (MEC) OTTAWA STORE -

A CASE STUDY FOR AN ENVIRONMENTALLY SUSTAINABLE BUILDING.

OVERVIEW: Mountain Equipment Co-op's Ottawa store was the first retail building in Canada

designed to meet NRCAN's C-2000 standard for energy efficient and environmentally sustainable buildings. The building consumes only 40% of the energy permitted under the Model National Energy Code for Buildings. Many of its building materials are reused or recycled and were selected to ensure a healthy indoor environment. The building also has been designed to be disassembled when no longer required. The building has met with a positive public response and achieves MEC's goal of treading lightly

on the earth.

Christopher Simmonds says that prior to designing the Ottawa MEC store his most environmentally sensitive building design was his own garden shed. Architects Christopher Simmonds and Linda Chapman were selected by International Design Magazine as one of their 2001 "Top Forty" socially conscious design firms for their

work on this building.



also the councillor responsible for Sustainable Design at the Ontario Association for Architects.














#### TABLE TOP DISPLAY

Patric Renault reported that La Cité Collégiale may be forming a new student chapter.


Frank Vaculik reviewed the TEGA Award Criteria and pointed out nomination forms are on each table and deadline for submission is March 18th (next chapter meeting).

The evening program "The NIST Advanced Measurement Laboratory – A Case Study of Designing for Nanotechnology" was presented by speakers Ahmad Soueid, RA – Principal/Senior Vice-President and Ted Zsirai, PE – Senior Vice President/Mechanical Section Manager, both of HDR Architecture, Inc., Alexandria, Virginia. They reviewed the nanotechnology requirements of test laboratories where temperature, humidity. cleanliness, vibration and other environmental factors must be tightly controlled to create the "world's most stable environment" for their client's testing and research requirements. They presented an overview of the NIST facility in Gaithersburg, Maryland and demonstrated the control strategies, construction challenges and end devices that were incorporated into their design, mock-ups and construction of the facility.


















#### **TEGA Awards**

The purpose of the ASHRAE Technology Awards program is to:

- Recognize ASHRAE members who design and/or conceive innovative technological concepts that are proven through actual operating data;
- Communicate innovative systems designs to other ASHRAE members;
- Highlight technological achievements of ASHRAE to others, including associated professionals and societies worldwide, as well as building and facility owners.

Awards are presented first to the chapter's TEGA committee, then it may be presented to the Region. And the best submissions for the region may be presented to Society. These awards are grouped in seven different categories:

- Commercial Buildings (New and Existing); Institutional Buildings (New and Existing);
- Health Care Facilities (New and Existing); ,Industrial Facilities or Processes (New and Existing);
- Public Assembly (New and Existing); Residential (New and Existing); Alternative or Renewable Energy Use.

At the Society level, for each category a first, second, and honorable mention winner may be named. Also, one of the category first place winners may be selected to receive the ASHRAE Award of Engineering Excellence. The recipient will have demonstrated the best overall compliance with the judging criteria.

The submissions for the chapter awards are very simple. A short form is filled out and presented to the TEGA chair (Joel Primeau) or the TEGA awards coordinator (Frank Vaculik). Joel and Frank can help you fill out your form.

This is a great opportunity to toot your own horn. We tend to downplay our engineering and design skills as ordinary when in fact the work we do is important, challenging and extraordinary. Don't be shy! If you think you might have a good project to submit, then you probably do!

#### HISTORY - 50 YEARS AGO

1954-55

The October meeting of the Chapter was held at the New Prescott Hotel. During the business session President W. J. Robinson told the Chapter that in the new re-zoning, he was pleased to report that Canada still remains a separate zone and would be zone 11. The subject of the society name change was discussed amongst the chapter members. President W. J. Robinson urged that all members entitled to vote make their voice heard and vote. The speaker for the evening was Mr. Sweeney, manager central Ontario sales, Fiberglass Canada Ltd. His presentation was on fiberglass insulation. A fiberglass fishing rod was raffled off at the end of the meeting which was won by D. Banton.

At November's meeting Past President G. Ostiguy was presented with the Past President's pin and a silver tray as a gift from the Chapter. The speaker for the evening was Mr. Strain of the Rudd Mfg. Co.. His subject was on *The Development of Natural Gas Industry in Canada*. An interesting quote from the speaker was "Known reserves in Canada today are enough for an estimated 50 years with only 5% of the estimated reserves discovered today."

January's meeting program was a panel discussion on *Heating, Ventilating, and Air Conditioning*; the meeting was adjourned at 10:20pm.

The February meeting was postponed to the 21st in lieu of the 15th as it would conflict with the society meeting in Philadelphia. The treasurers reported a balance of \$309.63 and that 40 members had paid their dues to date. The Canadian representative on the nominating committee would be W. Pennock of Ottawa, while the alternate delegate would be W. Hole of Montreal. The society would be charging an extra rate for the Journal and that it would be up to the members option wether they receive the journal. At the Toronto CRC a Canadian Chapter Committee was formulated to encourage ideas and growth of the society in Canada. A motion was passed that the delegate and alternate at the CRC would automatically be the president and vice-president. This motion was later withdrawn due to J. Klassens' objections as to the validity of this motion for constitutional reasons as this might mean a change in the by-laws. The speaker for the evening was Dr. N.B. Hutcheon of the National Research Council and his topic was Humidity in Canadian Buildings.

The May meeting was the last meeting of the year. The retiring president gave his report of the past year reviewing highlights such as the increase in attendance at meetings. The new board was elected into office as follows:
