### **Evening Program** (8:20 - 9:25)

Program: CIDA's Engagement in Afghanistan

Speaker: Jamie Graves, Assistant Director CIDA Afghanistan

Rod Potter introduced the evening speaker.

Mr. Graves discussed the government of Canada's overall military and diplomatic strategy for Afghanistan. An overview of the political history over the past 50 years was presented. Under recent Taliban rule, life for the Afghan people was very socially restrictive and in particular with respect to the treatment of women.

With the removal of the Taliban regime, the Bonn Process allowed for a full election of a parliament of which Canada played a leading role. Outstanding challenges for the future include security, lack of institutional and human capacity (e.g. educational facilities, professionals, etc...) and poverty (Afghanistan is the fifth poorest nation in the world).

In Afghanistan, people are killed every day by abandoned mines and 90% of the worlds poppy flowers (used to produce heroin) are grown there. To stabilize Afghanistan, the country needs to be demilitarized and the drug trade needs to be controlled. This is currently being addressed by a NATO initiative called the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF). The ISAF is currently being led by Canada and is in command of over 17,000 multinational troops. On the diplomatic front, Canada Provincial Reconstruction Team (PRT) is working with the locals on many levels (e.g. community outreach programs). The PRT is unique to Canada and is becoming a model for other nations.
